


Park City

Winter is prime time at Utah's most popular ski town. To track down the coolest diversions, listen to the locals

IT'S NOT JUST the crisp mountain air that makes <u>Park City</u> so refreshing. Unlike some other magnetic ski towns, this one doesn't take itself too seriously. Even when the snow season is at its peak and tourists outnumber residents, Park City [1] still has an inviting small-town feel—thanks partly to free public transit, including the quaint Main Street Trolley and a fleet of zero-emission electric buses. From Main Street [4], an in-town lift whisks skiers right up to the Wasatch Peaks, making the entire

town a de facto ski base. Down at street level, brewers and distillers have arrived in the wake of Utah's newly relaxed liquor laws. But Park City is starting to lean into luxury, with the recent addition of the Lodge at Blue Sky, an Auberge Resort; next year, the residences at Golderner Hirsch open, promising a modern twist on a classic lodge. For a cheat sheet to the most diverting diversions, both indoors and out, we asked four locals to share their favorite spots.—Debra Kamin
